### **Introduction and Methodology**

### **Objectives**

The objective of this study is to explore political views, as well as views relating to Israel, among the two main sectors of American Orthodox Jewry: (1) Modern Orthodox (sometimes referred to as Centrist Orthodox); and (2) Haredi (sometimes referred to as Ultra-Orthodox).

The Modern Orthodox (MO) sector comprises about one-third of the Orthodox population, and it melds observance of Jewish law (*halacha*) and practices with acceptance of and interaction with secular society and culture. The Haredi sector (its individual members are referred to as "Haredim") comprises about two-thirds of Orthodoxy, and it is more stringent in observance of *halacha* and resistant to interactions with secular society.

### **Methodology and Survey Responses**

This online survey was conducted August 28 to September 18, 2024. Respondents were Orthodox Jews, age 18 or older, who reside in the USA or can vote in US elections. The survey was anonymous and confidential; the research instrument (questionnaire) is shown in Appendix III.

We reached the community through a combination of email blasts comprised mainly of Haredim (Jewish Charedi Network, Vosizneias, Rockland County List), and through an Opt-In list of past Nishma Research survey respondents, comprised of both Modern Orthodox and Haredim. The number of responses is shown in the table to the right.

### **Sample Representativeness**

In light of the fact that almost all survey research has moved from phone surveys to online surveys, much has been written about the challenges and limitations of this approach, particularly in terms of obtaining a sample that is representative of the population. See Appendix II (page 27) for a discussion of our approach.

### **Verbatim Responses**

We view responses to open-ended questions as a valuable "qualitative addendum" of sorts to the quantitative findings. We encourage our audience to read the verbatim comments, which are presented unedited. This report

includes random samples of the responses and summaries thereof. All of the verbatim comments (and all Nishma Research reports) are available at http://nishmaresearch.com/social-research.html.

### **Past Surveys**

This is the third in a series of studies of the Orthodox community that surveys its members' political views.

A September 2023 survey explored trends in Orthodox Jewish political attitudes and Behaviors over the past 40+ years; and a February 2024 survey (i.e., during the Gaza War) explored changes in political views, as well as views relating to Israel and Zionism.

In this report, there are some comparisons to results from the prior surveys, as appropriate.

Note: Some Ashkenazic spelling is used in the questionnaire, e.g., Chasidish instead of Hasidic, as more recognizable to respondents.



Comparing Views on Trump, Biden & Harris – Haredim overwhelmingly prefer Trump. Modern Orthodox are split on Biden but lean toward more negative views of Harris. Across all of Orthodoxy (Modern Orthodox and Haredi combined), 79% have a positive view of Trump's policies relating to Israel, 29% have a positive view of Biden's Israel policies, and 17% have a positive view of Harris's Israel policies.

Most Admired U.S. Politicians – The following are the responses to the open-ended question "What U.S. politician – national or local – do you admire most?" Combining Modern Orthodox and Haredi responses in proportion to their representation in the Orthodox community, the most admired politicians are Nikki Haley (11%), Donald Trump (10%), Ron DeSantis (7%), Richie Torres (6%), and John Fetterman (5%) ... with 12% saying "no one."



MO from 39% to 45%, Haredi from 90% to 93%. Interestingly, the vote was virtually identical to what it would have been in a Trump-Biden election.



### 2024 Presidential Voting Intention by Gender and Age, and by Education - Among

the Modern Orthodox, younger women (under 50) show dramatically stronger support of Harris (72%), while older men (50+) are the strongest pro-Trump group (54%). Among both segments support for Trump is higher among those with less secular education, and higher for Harris among those with post-BA education.



### **Voting Preference by Level of Secular Education**

**Modern Orthodox** – With post-BA education, Harris 56%; with BA or less, Harris 52%. **Haredi** – With post-BA education, Trump 88%; with BA or less, Trump 96%.

All Orthodox Combined – Those with post-BA education lean about 6% more to Harris.

Issues That Are Most Important to the Voters – Israel, antisemitism, and the economy top issues driving both Modern Orthodox and Haredi voters. After that, there are notable differences in the priorities. The arrows (1) denote the sector of Orthodoxy that sees an issue as notably more influential with respect to the vote.

### The Importance of Israel in Influencing the Vote: Sample of Verbatim Responses -

The reasons most often given are existential security (the safety of Jews worldwide, including antisemitism); personal connection (live or have family there); essential for Jewish identity, religious beliefs, and the future of the Jewish people.

### Major Issues Facing the Jewish Community: Sample of Verbatim Responses -

Going beyond factors affecting the vote, we asked: "What do you think is the major issue facing your Jewish community these days?" Responses were far-ranging, but to summarize: The top concern among both MO and Haredi is antisemitism, followed among MO by assimilation and Jewish identity, affordability, disunity, leadership and education; and among Haredi by affordability, disunity, materialism and superficiality, the shidduch crisis, and religious leadership.

### Why Orthodox Jews Plan to Vote for Trump: Sample of Verbatim Responses –

Reasons given by Modern Orthodox and Haredim are similar, and most often focus on support of Israel, the economy, immigration, perceptions of strength, and a dislike of Harris, the Democratic Party and its liberal ideals. (Based on 136 Modern Orthodox responses and 635 Haredi responses)

### Why Orthodox Jews Plan to Vote for Harris: Sample of Verbatim Responses –

Reasons given by Modern Orthodox and Haredim are similar, and most often focus on very strong dislike of Trump as a person and danger to democracy, and Harris's views, knowledge and demeanor. (Based on 187 Modern Orthodox responses and 27 Haredi responses)

- Her policy on Israel is favorable and most reasonable for a foreign ally.
   She wants peace but also is unyielding in her support.
- Even if I didn't like her—which I do—Trump is such a threat to the country and to Jews that I would have to vote against him. But I agree with almost all of Harris' positions.
- Trump is crazy.
- Her views on domestic politics are more in line with my own, I think trumps sort of populism is dangerous
- To defeat Trump
- Although I do not agree with everything she stands for, a vote for Trump is a vote for stripping Jewish people of their rights as Americans to practice their religion as they see fit. It's also a vote to continue to roll back protections for women and LGBT individuals.

A Survey of Orthodox Jewish Political Views:

- Impact of the Presidential Debate
  - Among respondents who responded to the survey after the 9/10/24 debate, 65% of MO and 57% of Haredi respondents watched all or some of the debate. Among them, 19% of MO and 7% of Haredi said the debate had an affect on their opinion of voting preference, almost always in favor of Harris.
- Impact of the Vice-Presidential Candidates
  - 62% say the VP candidates do not affect their voting decision, while 9% say it has a significant impact and 29% say it has a slight impact. While no one mentioned the VP as a factor in their voting decision, 15% of MO and 5% of Haredi Trump voters indicated that Josh Shapiro as Harris's running mate might have influenced their vote.

Issues Driving the State and Local Election Vote – Haredim seem to be more "tuned in" to local election issues than the Modern Orthodox, at least based on the number of factors they see as very important and the fact that political party is less important to them locally. Every factor is seen as more important by Haredim, notable positions on schools' substantial equivalency requirements and instructions from Jewish community leaders.

Combining those who responded "absolutely" with 50% of those who responded "probably," we find that 6% of Modern Orthodox see this as the most important issue, and 34% of Haredim see this as the most important issue. We did not probe the specific concerns, and it may be likely that many of the MO support Substantial Equivalency Requirements and that perhaps most of the Haredim oppose it.

### **Appendix II – The Challenges of Sampling the Orthodox Community**

In light of the fact that almost all survey research done in the U.S. has moved from phone to online, much has been written about the resulting challenges and limitations, particularly in terms of obtaining a sample that is representative of the population.

#### The Unique Sampling Challenges

Surveying the Orthodox community in the United States poses particular challenges for at least three reasons. One is size and dispersion; the community comprises about 0.3% of the U.S. population, and the Modern Orthodox comprise about 0.1%, and much of the community – outside of a few large cities – is logistically hard to find and reach via a survey. Second is its diversity. Haredim (ultra-Orthodox) are quite different from Modern Orthodox, and there is very considerable diversity within each of the two groups. And third, there is no universally recognized, objective source of community census data, so determinations of sample representativeness are necessarily subjective.

Accordingly, it is difficult to arrive at a truly representative sample given the size and somewhat limited access to the community, especially the Haredim. And it is challenging to account for selection bias in so far as those inclined to respond to an online poll represent a sub-set of the larger community. Given the uncertainties around sample representativeness, we do not specify sample errors, which is the widely accepted practice; specific point data should be viewed as estimates.

#### The Four Sources We Use to Obtain Our Samples

- Rabbinic Organizations: Synagogue membership is extremely widespread (near universal) in the Orthodox community. Nishma Research has distributed a number of broad community wide surveys through rabbinic members of the RCA, the major body of nearly 1,000 Orthodox rabbis and many member synagogues, the National Council of Young Israel (a group of about 100 Modern Orthodox synagogues), and the International Rabbinic Fellowship (a group of about 60 rabbis). Nishma has worked through congregational rabbis to distribute surveys to their members, and that has been very successful in generating responses.
- Individual Synagogues: We have invited individual synagogue rabbis and presidents to participate in surveys, and we have selected a geographically-diverse, size-diverse, and ideologically-diverse mix of synagogues.
- Our Opt-In Panel: Given that Nishma has conducted 17 broad community surveys, our total number of respondents within the Orthodox community who have opted to participate has grown to over 6,000. These respondents cover wide and, we believe, reasonably representative distributions in terms of their gender, age, marital status, education and income. About half live in the greater New York area (New York City, New Jersey, Westchester/Rockland, and Connecticut), and half live in other parts of

the country. We ask respondents where they position themselves religiously within Modern Orthodoxy; a plurality say they are centrist.

• Email Blast Lists: There are some excellent marketing services that generate email blast lists, and we use many of them. For example, we have used lists such as Jewish Link, a very large, tri-state area publication; Talkline, the email list of the largest online orthodox radio program in the U.S.; and others in the Modern Orthodox community. We have also effectively used lists in the Haredi community; for example, Nishma did a survey for Hatzalah, the emergency medical service, using Haredi community email blast lists, and this generated over 3,000 responses.

### **Assessing Our Findings**

We're not aware of any other surveys that have published findings for the Orthodox community on this topic, but a bit of "reverse engineering" can at least tell us whether our findings are in the ballpark.

The Pew Research Center found Orthodoxy as a whole to lean 75% Republican, 20% Democrat, and 5% Other/none. (https://www.pewresearch.org/religion/2021/05/11/ u-s-jews-political-views/)

If we combine our Haredi 93% for Trump with our Modern Orthodox 45% for Trump, and we do so in proportion to the two sectors' representation in the Orthodox community (approximately 66%/34%), we come up with a figure of 77% for Trump among all Orthodox, which hews closely to the Pew figure on party affiliation (which correlates strongly with voter intention.)

Admittedly, the 45% rate for Trump among the Modern Orthodox might be low if, as one political observer opined, Trump supporters are less likely to respond to surveys. But the same problem does not seem to exist in the Haredi world, and the combined numbers, we surmise, appear plausible.

#### **Future Options to Understand the Community**

More survey research could be of value. Beyond surveying, we have in the past explored use of voting precinct data. While useful data are available for a very small number of Haredi communities (where they comprise a significant proportion of all voters), but there are not concentrated Modern Orthodox communities where such data are of notable value, as the Modern Orthodox comprise a very small minority of their precincts' total voting population.

We offer the results of this survey as one benchmark that indicates overwhelming Haredi support for Trump and a much more mixed outcome among Modern Orthodox. And, of course, this survey research lets us explore additional politically related views among Orthodox Jews.
